

# 'Save Our Valley' Officials Quizzed at Airport Hearing

## Group Given Opportunity to State Case Against Jet Service During PUC Probe

Public Utilities Commission hearing examiner Martin J. Porter gave protesting Valley residents an opportunity yesterday to state why they objected to regularly scheduled jet service at Van Nuys Airport. ### Quizzed by Attorney

Former Gov. Edmund G. Brown, a member of the law firm, attended the session and conferred frequently with Tumlinson.

Several members of the Valley association were placed on the stand and questioned by Tumlinson and the attorney for Air Metropolitan, Robert Schureman.

Among them was Ronald White of Encino, one of the founders of the Save Our Valley Association.

White stated that the group objected to Air Metropolitan's request because they feel the Valley does not need a second airport — that the Van Nuys Burbank Airport is adequate, that Valley residential areas will suffer from noise as would schools, that Van Nuys Airport should be maintained as a general aviation facility and that establishing regular airline service there is poor planning.

### Introduced Circulars

Earlier, Tumlinson had introduced as a witness Mrs. Delrene Malouin of Sepulveda who presented petitions the association had prepared and signed by 30,480 residents who oppose jet service at Van Nuys.

Schureman introduced into evidence two circulars which White admitted were printed by Save Our Valley Association in January.

White said the 20,000 leaflets were distributed from door to door and at meetings in the Hills area, West Los Angeles and the major portion of Ventura County in the southern part of the Los Angeles basin as Air Metropolitan's application.

Five juveniles were booked on narcotic charges after police were called to a apartment house in Canoga Park on Wednesday night because of a loud party. The officers said they found 16 persons in the apartment.

They were admitted by a 12-year-old boy. Inside they found marijuana cigarettes and a water pipe on a coffee table. They also found a sealed brown bottle hidden in the plumbing hydroenic needle, eyepdropper, and a spoon and plastic bags used for storing and measuring methedrone.

Officers took into custody three girls, 12, 13 and 14, who had marijuana on them. One of whom had red marks on their arms. All three were runaways, police said. The other two boys, one 14 and the other 17.

A 28-year-old Son Valley man and another 19, from Granada Hills, were arrested for being drunk on drugs after their car, driven without lights, was stopped Wednesday night at 7507 Woodman Ave.

Police said the men were stuporous, spoke with slurred speech and had trouble standing.

Two young men were arrested on a possession of marijuana charge, one of whom was caught after he ran from the scene at Wyandotte St. and Ventura Canyon Ave. on Wednesday night.

Police said they stopped the car in which the men were riding because he had no headlights or taillights. The driver grabbed a cigarette package the officer had taken from the suspect's shirt pocket and ran.

Other officers arriving at the scene found the driver in a vacant lot. Police said they also recovered a cigarette package which contained marijuana seeds. The narcotic seeds also were found in the vehicle, police said.

The suspects are a 19-year-old Arleta man and a 16-year-old youth from Pacoima.

Six years ago, councilmen employed only nine field deputies and they worked for Councilman Everett Burkhalter in the First District, Shepard in the Third District, Bernardi in the Seventh District, Edelman in the Ninth District, and John Holland in the 14th District.
